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
Foreword



In the Beginning

A reflection and pictures of Andover Bowling Club in its earlier days as recorded by Derek Spencer since he joined the club in 1957 and knowledge gained from past members and from many conversations with the late Archie Mitchell, Jack Blake and Harry Paris.

Derek Spencer, Club Secretary for 10 years and Green Keeper after the club took over the maintenance of the green, was keen to record his memories permanently. He found great pleasure in wandering down memory lane and he researched much history of the club's earlier days.

Andover Bowling Club

The Green was originally situated on the corner of Vigo Road and the then East Street (now known as Eastern Avenue) and is now the site of a roundabout and under-pass. This site was in earlier times known as Coronation Gardens, specially laid out to commemorate the coronation of King Edward VII. (Figures 1 and 2)

During 1913 this area of grass was mown short and enough land prepared for bowling so a club was formed. Membership consisted mostly of council officials and employees and of local businessmen.

When the war broke out in 1914 membership dwindled as some were called up to serve in the forces which caused the club to disband until 1916 when again the same area was prepared and a trial game was arranged. The same two rinks were cut and rolled by a Mr. Jim White, a Council parks employee.

A report on this trial game was featured in the Andover Advertiser and it was stated that the game was played before a good ring of spectators assembled around the upper tennis courts. [not the present ones]. It was decided that the eastern half of the lawn provided a fair Green. The Mayor hoped that the revival of the game in the Borough would meet with success and provide an enjoyable recreation for many of the residents. He then bowled the jack and the first wood.

It was decided that during the coming winter a club should be re-formed and hope that all sections of the community would join so that in the future matches could be arranged with other clubs. It depended on the numbers of people showing an interest how far the council would go in providing a full sized green.

A game took place on September 23, 1916. The club was re-formed, a committee elected and the club successfully applied for membership to the Salisbury and District association. Other clubs in the league were Salisbury, Durrington, Wilton, Amesbury, Great Bedwyn, Alderbury and Pewsey Vale.

During 1917 with the war still in progress, the local club entertained a team from New Zealand who were stationed at Bulford and Tidworth.

The Whitchurch bowling league was formed in 1934. At the inaugural meeting, Mr Vic Bull (Andover delegate) proposed that the entrance fee to the league be ten shillings and sixpence for the first team and seven shillings and sixpence for additional teams. The motion was accepted, and it was decided that only clubs within a 6 mile radius be allowed to join. Once the league was established, it was decided to extend the limit beyond 6 miles, which then included the Basingstoke area.

The Andover Club became affiliated to the Hampshire County Bowling Association during the late 1920s. There are no records of any local success in the county competitions until the 1940s.

The Andover Club had the honour of providing the president for the HCBA. The person nominated from the club was Mr Rowland Bramwell Kendall, a Master Printer, Newsagent and Stationer. He was also an Alderman of the Borough Council, a Justice of the Peace, and was Mayor of Andover in 1925 and 1937.

The clubhouse was built of timber during the late 1920s. It had a corrugated roof, double doors facing the green and a back door leading to the road alongside the alms houses (which are still occupied). This clubhouse was financed by members of the club; it was built and maintained by the Council.

It was eventually extended to incorporate a small kitchen and a gent's toilet. The kitchen was very small and narrow and contained only a sink and a gas copper for heating water for teas and for washing up. A very small window was situated high up. When the copper boiled it was like a Turkish bath. Food for matches was mainly prepared at home by the lady caterers, or on some occasions sandwiches were laid on at the Borough Arms opposite.

Each year the Club President changed, as the position was always held by the Mayor of Andover. The presentation of trophies was carried out at the AGM, which was held at the library (then in Bridge Street) but later in the clubhouse.

By the early 1930s the Green had been extended to six rinks. Play continued until the end of September. Autumn maintenance commenced in October. Top dressing was delivered loose by lorry and shovelled onto the concrete floor of the clubhouse via the single back door, as there was no vehicular access to the green. In those days it consisted of sterilized loam, agricultural sand, peat, bone meal and dried blood from the slaughterhouse - no chemicals in those days!

During the 1952 season, a very prominent member of the Club reached the quarter finals of three County competitions, Singles, Pairs and Triples. He was Archie Mitchell.

In the 1960s a letter was sent to members wives asking them to meet at the clubhouse in the hopes of getting volunteers to take on the catering as the old stalwarts were, through age, no longer able to cope. Phemie Forrester, Maggie Setters and Chris Spencer came to the rescue. In 1968, some of the ladies showed an interest in bowling, but a few of the men (mostly quite elderly) were not too happy to have ladies encroaching on their green. However, they finally gave in and Mrs. Spencer was asked to contact clubs in the region to arrange friendlies, which resulted in several matches being played.


As the ladies membership grew and reached the required eight members, they were able to apply for entry to the Hampshire County Womens Bowling Association (HCWBA) and were duly affiliated and eligible to enter County competitions and also to play in Southampton and District friendlies. As the ladies gained experience they applied to enter a ladies team in the Whitchurch League and were accepted, going from strength to strength. It was decided in 1990 and accepted at the AGM that Andover Bowling Club becomes a mixed club, with the exception of County competitions and the ladies championship. It was in the mid 70s the ladies were allocated Thursday evenings for matches plus afternoons, with the men having preference.

When the ladies were given the go-ahead, fixtures were arranged with the following clubs, Basingstoke Town, Great Bedwyn, Hungerford, Kingsclere, Newbury, Pewsey Vale, Salisbury Victoria, Whitchurch, Thatcham, Old Basing, Friary, Amesbury and Wilton. As we were not experienced at this time it was these other clubs who gave us confidence and experience.


The Club was told by the Council that it must always leave one rink available for any member of the public to pay and play and we also had to delegate non-working members as daily stewards to be in attendance on their allocated day to issue tickets and collect money.

A ten foot extension was built on the front of the present clubhouse by the Council and the floorboards covered in vinyl, and later the Council allowed us to incorporate the unused public toilets and the attendance office [once used for hiring out tennis courts and putting equipment] to allow us more space to reorganise our clubhouse.

A bar was installed and changing rooms improved. Due to the lack of funds the Council was unable to give the green the treatment required, and delegates from the club met to discuss the problem and it was suggested that the club take over the maintenance of the green and pay a peppercorn rent on a twenty-one year lease.

When we first occupied the clubhouse we were faced with a floor of bare boards which were badly pitted by spikes worn by the cricketers, as it was actually built as a cricket pavilion. When we brushed the floor we used to water it first to keep the dust from flying everywhere. Later the council laid a Vinyl covering. When we took over the maintenance of the green the club also purchased the mats, jacks and seats. One seat was the club's property and was brought up from the old green, it was presented to the club in memory of a Mr Seagrove and is still in use.

The old black-and-white painted honours boards were put in store by the Council in their depot in Bachelors Barn Road. They were riddled with woodworm and have since been burned.

Several county friendlies have been played on both our old green and the present one. The ladies only played on the new green. For quite a few years on both greens we used to run open tournaments both ladies' and men's Singles, Pairs and Mixed Triples. They were so popular that visitors would ask to be booked in for the following year. Sadly, in recent years they have been dropped. It was not unusual to make around £300 profit on one event. Our regular supporters were very disappointed.

There have been several Bowling Greens in Andover over the years; the Peacock Inn, Hovis, Folly Inn, Andover Old Green and Andover present Green.

From the Archives

Since the early days, the club has kept the eager populace of Andover abreast of the Club's activities through the columns of our local journals. Recent years have seen several members of the club submit weekly reports - among them: Derek Spencer, Ken Eaton, Johnnie Johnson and Jim Horne. The following extracts, relating to Andover Bowling Club, are from cuttings from the Andover Advertiser and Evening Echo collected by Chris Spencer and Irene Hunt.

1968 - Andover Open Tournament (Old Green) Soton Players Meet in Final

Two of Andover's county players, Jackie Blake and Archie Mitchell, justified their selection for Hampshire by reaching the last four of 62 entries in the Andover Bowling Club's Open Tournament on Saturday.

But what could have been an all-Andover final turned out to be a Southampton affair when they were eliminated by R. Lott of Atherley and C. Bridle of Banister Park respectively.

Mr Lott went on to win by 15 shots to 3 in the last final to be held on the old green. He was presented with a trophy by the Mayor of Andover (Ald. L. A. Porter) who added: "Perhaps next year some of you would come along to help the Mayor's side; beat the bowling club for the first time on the new green in the Recreation Ground."

Play lasted for over nine hours on the club's six rinks with competitors from Lyndhurst, Southampton, Aldershot, Hungerford and Pewsey taking part.

There were some early shocks, too. Last year's winner, Mr. H. Baker of Whitchurch, was knocked out in the preliminary rounds by Frank Mew of Andover. Then several county players from Hampshire and Wiltshire were eliminated in the later rounds. These included Mr. Laurie Marles, last year's President of the Hampshire Bowling Association.

Mr. Bill Howard, the organiser of the event said: "It's not a record entry, but it is certainly the biggest we have had for some years. At least we have been lucky with the weather last year we had a thunderstorm half way through the tournament."

Mr Sid Butler, the Captain of the Club, thanked those who had helped with the tournament, especially Mrs. D. Forrester and Mrs. D. Spencer for their help with the refreshments. After welcoming the Mayor he went on to present Ald. Porter with the Andover Bowling Club badge.

1969 - Last ABC v Mayor's Team on the Old Green

LAST ANNUAL FIXTURE

What was probably the last annual Mayor's side v. Andover Bowling Club fixture on the old green took place on Friday. Next year's fixture will take place on the newly constructed green on the Recreation Ground.

However, after the match the club's captain, Mr Sid Butler, expressed the wish that a special match between the club and a Mayor's side should be staged to mark the end of the old green. The Andover side had finished a successful evening, winning four of the five rinks by 123 to 74 shots. Councillor Cecil Horne - newly capped by Hampshire - was a member of the team which prevented an overwhelming victory by the club.

1969 - Ladies Accepted as Full Members of Andover Bowling Club

BOWLS - described contemptuously by the young as "an old man's game" - has undergone a dramatic "face-lift" in recent years.

The "old man" image has gone, young men - some of them in their teens - are making their mark in this leisurely paced, sometimes back-aching but nevertheless skilful game favoured by the retired as a means of relaxation and exercise. In many parts of the country the arrival on the lush greens of the opposite sex has been welcomed and encouraged.

Andover Bowling Club, however, long resisted any female invasion of this male stronghold. "The masculine sanctuary must be preserved at all cost." was the cry. But the anti-feminine brigade eventually crumbled under unrelenting pressure and last year the Andover green was opened to women for the first time.

There was, however, no immediate clamour for a place on the hallowed membership. Andover women were understandably a bit shy in coming forward to join. Membership-(at 25/a season) slowly built up to six. They have all renewed their membership for the present season, now in full swing; they are now accepted by their male counterparts as part of the Andover bowling scene and are anxious to swell their ranks.

Enthusiasm

They make up for their lack of numbers and experience with endeavour and enthusiasm. The potential is there, as one Hungerford man recently learned to his cost. He was soundly beaten by one of the Andover ladies playing in her first tournament.

Afterwards the embarrassed gent commented: "I daren't go home and tell them I was beaten by a woman." A comment which will no doubt be repeated many times when the Andover ladies get into their stride.

One of the first women to join the Andover club was Mrs. Cissie Clark, a former Mayor of the town, and a silver medalist in the All-England Junior Cross-country Championships. "I enjoy the game very much. I find it very relaxing and entertaining," she said.

And how about the male attitude to women players? "They are very friendly. They certainly don't consider us a nuisance. I would like to see many more women take up the game." Another who enjoys the game is Mrs. Margaret Hewitt of Corunna Main. "It gives me an

interest outside the home. I play a couple of times a week - usually on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons and sometimes on a Saturday."

It was Margaret, mother of two, who claimed the scalp of the Hungerford man in her first tournament a couple of weeks ago.

"The men are really good about it all and help us all they can. They certainly don't make me feel I am in the way."

Mrs. Euphemia Forrester, also of Corunna Main, joined the club last season. "My father-in-law was a keen bowler when he was alive. My husband and' son are both members and when they opened membership to women I decided to join".

Helpful

"I like the game, but I will need to improve a lot before I take part in competitions. I find the men very helpful." she said.

Mrs. M. Bradley of Millway Road, has lived in the town for 12 years: "I would have joined years ago if I had been allowed." A bit more experienced than most of the others, Mrs. Bradley says she enjoys playing in the competitions.

"The men treat us as equals; they are most helpful."

Said Mrs. Christine Spencer of Recreation Road, Andover: "My husband is a keen bowler and I decided to follow suit. If you can't beat them--join them. The men treat us very well indeed. They are a very cheerful crowd up here. They welcome us any time to join them in a game." Mrs. Spencer plays as often as she can, usually on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons and sometimes at the week-end.

Mr. Victor William Bull of Vigo Road, Andover, is the club's oldest playing member.

He has been a member for 33 years and was one of the founders of the Whitchurch and District Bowling League. "I am quite happy to see the women here. I think it is a very good thing." he said.

Any woman interested in joining the club (membership 25/- a season) is invited to "roll along" to the green on the Recreation Ground any Tuesday, Wednesday or Saturday afternoon.

25 April 1970 - New Andover Green Opens

After the opening the club played their first match on the green of Cumberland turf against a team of County bowlers led by County President Mr. H. Symes of Winchester. Due to the poor weather conditions only 15 ends were played, but despite this, an enjoyable afternoon was had by both teams. The President's team just had the edge on the local players and won the match by six shots, 81 to 75. Club chairman Cecil Horne, thanked the President for attending the opening and in replying, Mr. Symes said that the new green could be used for county games. Andover skipper Sid Butler thanked the borough council, Parks and Properties Committee and the Parks Department employees who laid the new green.

27 August 1973 - Bowls Club's First Ladies' Tournament

ANDOVER BOWLING Club's first ever tournament held at Vigo Road green on Saturday, turned out to be such a success that it is likely to become an annual event.

There were 30 entries representing Clubs from Hampshire, Wiltshire and Berkshire. Play started in the morning and by mid-afternoon the quarter final stage was reached.

Andover's last representative, Mrs. C. Spencer, was eliminated at this stage, leaving Mrs. Wyer and Mrs. Parry both of Devizes, Mrs. Ford of Whitchurch and Mrs. Chapman of Newbury in the semi-finals.

Mrs. Wyer defeated her clubmate by 16 shots to 7 in one semi-final and Mrs. Chapman beat Mrs. Ford by 15 shots to 12 in the other.

In the final Mrs. Chapman proved no match for Mrs Wyer who become Andover's first ladies champion with a convincing 15 shots to 3 victory.

Prizes were presented by Andover ladies section chairman, Mrs. C. Clark, who also thanked Mr and Mrs Spencer for organising the competition and the ladies who provided the refreshments.

Back at club level Andover played two matches in the past week. Last Thursday Basingstoke Police visited the local rink for a Whitchurch League game and were defeated by 18 shots.

Andover also finished winners on Sunday when they visited Camberley to play a friendly match. The ladies section were beaten by 11 shots in their match with Camberley ladies.

February 1972 - Bowls Club Dinner

After a lapse of fourteen years, Andover Bowling Club held a dinner at the Western, Bridge Street, Andover, on Friday, and it is hoped that once again it will become an annual event. Afterwards the Mayoress, Mrs. G. Finch, presented a cup to Mrs. "Cissie" Clark on behalf of the Ladies - section to be known as the Josie Finch Cup. It will be competed for in a ladies open tournament each year.

30 June 1973 - Open Singles Competition Mitchell wins bowls title

ARCHIE MITCHELL, one of Andover's most experienced bowlers, won the local club's open singles title for the second time, last Saturday, in a bowling career that has spanned more than 40 years.

Mitchell, a former National pairs player, showed all :his skill on the

Vigo Road recreation ground green to defeat Salisbury's Tony Ward by 15 shots to seven in the final.

There were 64 entries from as far afield as Swindon and Southampton and, at the quarter final stage, things were looking bright for the host club with five players still in the competition. It soon became apparent that due to the draw Andover would have at least one player in the final.

Mitchell cruised through his quarter-final match with a 15-4 victory over club mate Jack Black and Ward beat Andover's John Forrester by 15-8.

Andover's Frank Mew won through to the semi-final with a 15-8 win over Jack Cook and Fleming Park's Mick Spreadbury, last year's finalist, beat Amesbury's Dennis Shipp 16-I2.

In an all-Andover semi-final Mitchell defeated Mew 15-8 and Ward beat Spreadbury 16-9. Mitchell then went on beat Ward in the final and his victory was greeted by loud cheers from local supporters.

The prizes were presented in the club pavilion by chairman Cecil Horne, who thanked Club secretary Derek Spencer for his fine work in organising the tournament and to the ladies for providing the refreshments.

14 July 1973 - Ladies Open Singles Tournament Pewsey Player Wins Ladies Bowls Title

The ladies section of the Andover Bowls Club held their annual Open Singles tournament at the Vigo Road green last Saturday.

Ladies from Hampshire, Wiltshire and Berkshire, including some with county experience and others who had played in the All-England championships at Wimbledon, were among 31 competitors. Some of these players were the victims of "giant-killing" acts in the early rounds and only one Andover player, Maisie Spinks, reached the guarter-finals.

The quarter-finals provided some thrilling contests for the spectators. Mrs Spinks came through quite easily with a 15-4 victory over Miss D. Gilbert of Pewsey. Last year's winner, Miss Maymie

Spelman of Winchester disposed of Mrs Beryl Herbert of Pewsey, 15-8. Mrs Margaret Pocock of Pewsey defeated her clubmate, Mrs Diana Giswick 15-9, and Miss E. Ellis of Southampton gained a 15-4 victory over Mrs Kay Nicol of Pewsey.

In the semi-finals Mrs Spinks fought back from behind at one stage to level the scores 10-10, against Mrs Pocock but eventually lost 15-10. In the other semi-final Mrs Spelman beat Miss Ellis 16-4.

The final between Mrs Pocock and Mrs Spelman was a close game which took 70 minutes to complete. After some tight bowling from both players, Mrs Pocock pulled ahead to win by 15 shots to 10, and became tournament winner.

Mrs Cissie Clark, chairman of the section presented the Josie Finch cup to the winner.

28 July 1973 - ABC Pairs Tournament (England Internationals Defeated)

ANDOVER Bowling Club's third annual open pairs tournament on Saturday was the most successful yet staged by the club.

It attracted entries of international and county players from Hampshire, Berkshire and Wiltshire and the list had to be closed well before the day of the tournament.

England captain Peter Line and his partner Mike Walton (Atherley) threatened to run away with the tournament which, up to the quarter-final stage, was dominated by Southampton players.

But Line and Walton were defeated 11-5 in their quarter-final by the Whitchurch pair Alan Ashfield and Ken Alexander. Ashfield and Alexander went on through to the final where they were leading another Atherley pair, Bill Hayman and Arthur Fletcher, both Middleton Cup players, by two shots with one end to play.

But Hayman and Fletcher picked up three shots on the last end to win by 12 shots to 11 in one of the most thrilling finals seen on the Andover green.

The cup and other prizes were presented by the Mayor of Andover, Alderman Martin Loveridge.

May 1974 - Bowlers Win County Badges

ANDOVER bowlers Derek Spencer and Frank Mew, who also play for St. Mary Bourne, were awarded their county badges after representing Hampshire for the fourth time last week.

In the Whitchurch and District League, Andover lost when they visited Portals, gaining only one point, but then recorded a fine home win over last year's runners up in the league, St. Mary Bourne. The rink, skippered by H. Saunderson, was the only winner against Portals, finishing three-shot victors over H. Tilbury's trio.

J. Forrester, H. Smith and P. Morris were the successful skips against St. Mary Bourne with a team total of 65 shots to 4l.

Andover were out of luck in their friendly matches last weekend, losing to Thatcham by nine shots and Wimborne by two shots.

1974 - Andover Bowl to Title

ANDOVER Bowls Club's grip on the Salisbury League title was still as strong as ever as the club overcame late challenges to grab their second successive championship.

Facing a strong Pewsey chase, Andover had to gain good results in their last matches to take the top spot. They boosted their hopes with an 88-61 win over Great Bedwyn at home, but almost immediately suffered a setback by dropping a point to Wilton in a 63 all draw. But Andover showed their character by edging home by 69-64 against Salisbury. This left just one match each for Andover and Pewsey. Club President Archie Mitchell led the side for a return against Wilton.

There was no repeat of the previous surprise result with Andover walking home by 98-54. After a long delay the Pewsey result was known - a defeat for the challengers, and Andover took the trophy.

Four members of the Andover club recently travelled to Aldermaston to play for Hampshire against Berkshire. Len West, John Forrester, Harold Saunderson and Jackie Blake did well on their rink to win by 21 shots to nine, but Berkshire took the honours to win the match by 112-111. John Forrester was playing his first game for the county, while Harold Saunderson received his County Badge on his fourth appearance.

The Hampshire County team will be entertaining Gloucester on the Vigo Road green next Wednesday at 2.30 with two members of the Andover club in the side, .Archie Mitchell and Jim Whiscombe

13 July 1974 - Ladies Singles Tournament

Record Turnout Despite Wet Weather

DESPITE last Saturday's wet weather, a record entry of 61 players from Hampshire, Wiltshire and Berkshire took part in Andover Bowling Club's women's open singles tournament at the Vigo Road green.

Play started at 9 a.m. in heavy rain, which continued throughout most of the day and some early round shock defeats were witnessed.

Miss M. Spelman, last year's runner-up, was beaten by Mrs. F. Figgins (Marlborough) and Mrs. Spencer the former indoor singles champion from the Atherley Club, Southampton, went out 15-10 to Mrs. A. Smith of the Friary Club, Winchester.

By the time the quarter-finals were reached late in the afternoon, the host club only had one player, Mrs. C. Spencer, remaining in the competition.

Mrs. Spencer, wife of the Andover Club secretary, was beaten by 15-6 by Friary's Mrs. M. Eldridge. The Winchester club had a second semi-finalist when Mrs. Bowen defeated clubmate Mrs. A. Smith 15-9.

The Mayfield Park Club, Southampton, also had two players winning through to the quarter-finals. Mrs M Deane moved safely through with a 15-6 defeat of Pewsey's Mrs D. Criswick but Mayfield Park's Mrs. D.

Acaster went down by the narrow margin of 15-13 to Pewsey's Mrs. M. Pocock, last year's tournament winner. Mrs. Pocock won through to the final with a convincing 15-1 defeat of Mrs. Eldridge and Mrs. Deane beat Mrs. Bowen 15-3 in the other semi-final.

Bowling Club Hit by Cash Crisis

ANDOVER Bowling Club is in danger of closing after 73 years (*sic*) unless they receive financial help.

Tournament secretary George Morris revealed the pressure the town club was under this week with an appeal for sponsors from local commerce and industry. 'We are not looking for a handout but have a genuine need,' he said. 'Help is needed if the club is to survive.'

He added that any kind of help would be appreciated, whether it be providing fertilizer for their Vigo Road Green or sponsoring any one of the six rinks at the three open tournaments they run each year.

Morris has written to all the members of the Andover and District Chamber of Commerce asking them to help the local club which now has a membership of around 70 players.

The Andover club official said they provided a means of recreation and social activity for both men and women from the Andover district. The club was run with minimal outside help and club members maintained the playing area along with the clubhouse throughout both winter and summer. Despite doubling the annual subscription to £25 they found that costs were still increasing. Last year they spent more than £3,000, with fertilizer alone costing £800.

They also had the additional expense of running two teams in the Whitchurch and District League and an another in the Salisbury League. They were the Whitchurch Division Four champions last year, were runners-up in Division Three and also ran three successful tournaments to boost funds, with players coming from as far as Bristol, Southampton and Reading to play.

Morris added that their biggest expense was the playing green and that the expensive equipment needed to keep it in a prime condition was now becoming obsolete.

They also had all the other usual bills to pay like rent, insurance, fees, postage and stationery, and had raised club fees by more than 56 per cent over the last two years in an attempt to make ends meet. But as most of our members are senior citizens there is a limit to the amount they can afford.

The Andover club's hard-working committee decided to launch an appeal to prevent the club from closing and anyone who could help is requested to contact Morris on Andover 51202.

Tennis Courts may be Converted

Residents living around Andover's Vigo Road recreation ground are to be asked their views on converting part of three derelict tennis courts into additional parking.

Their opinion will also be sought on the proposal to retain one as a tennis court and mark the third out for basketball, at a total cost of £12,000.

The courts have been targetted for the face-lift treatment to improve outdoor facilities for adolescents in the area and help provide more parking for the Andover Bowling club. The club has approached the council on several occasions about additional parking, which could help alleviate problems encountered on busy club days when members and visitors park on neighbouring roads, to the residents' annoyance.

But councillors at the recent leisure committee pointed out that although they agreed with the proposals, the additional parking would have to be monitored. Cllr George King added: "It's very close to the shops and I'm certain we would get a lot of shoppers using it. The bowlers wouldn't see any improvement so there must be some control over it."

November 1995 - Council Agrees Grant for Watering System Bowled Over by Lottery Rejection

Andover Bowling Club was nearly bowled over when it didn't get the £9,700 it expected from the National Lottery.

But today the leisure committee of Test Valley Borough Council was to try to remedy the situation. At the November meeting of the committee a grant of £5,100 was approved to provide an automatic sprinkler system at the club.

A report said "It was anticipated that National Lottery funding would be available for further works required to banks and ditches. This has proved not to be the case and the club has now requested a loan of $\pounds 9,700$ to facilitate this work." The committee has been recommended by officers to grant a loan of up to $\pounds 9,700$ to the club on terms to be agreed by officers.

Each player has an expert helper who stands at an angle instructing on the distance of the shot. The bowler aims toward them with the bowl's bias taking it toward the jack.

Fern Heathcock from Andover Bowling club helps run the session. "Amazingly, the two best bowlers are the most visually impaired. One member is now very keen to start entering individual competitions and we have been trying to contact the British Blind Bowling Association to organise some team fixtures." he said.

Ida Gray and Rod Ballance were given special awards for good progress, though Mrs Gray was unwell and was unable to attend.

Sponsorship Plea after Grant Bid Rejected

The original green was built in 1913 near the site of what is now the Vigo Road roundabout. When the roundabout was built the club relocated in the 1960s to its current site in the recreation ground. It was then the paving stones were laid. The club took over the lease of the green for 20 years in the 1990s.

Mr Johnston said: "We can afford to pay for the re-paving but that means that other projects, would have to go by the wayside."

They were planning, for example, to extend a pergola to provide more shelter for members. Mr Johnston said the only alternative now was sponsorship.

Test Valley Borough Council community development officer Steve Lincoln said the council had a system of criteria in place to ensure limited funds were distributed fairly and went where they were most needed. In the case of the Andover Bowling Club the panel decided it had sufficient funds to reinvest in improving facilities for members.

If anyone can help with sponsorship they are asked to contact Mr Johnston.
